7. Till Mar - tin Chur - chill took me in, and sent me round Cape Horn.



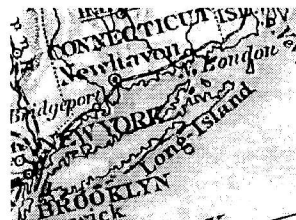

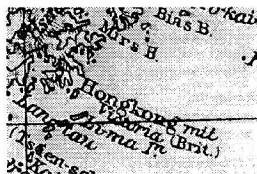
